decisions, decisions, decisions ...

"idea" / contents title cover binding size and format paper(s) no. of pages typeface(s) and size(s) pictorial material layout printing method(s) b & w / colour title & colophone pages endpapers edition size costs vs. price distribution method(s)

Remember that, ideally, all the 'parts' should come together and re-inforce each other to make 'the book'.

You should therefore not make these decisions in isolation from each other, but need to give some consideration to all of them from the beginning.

Often this becomes an iterative process involving several 'dummies' as a means of visualizing and resolving problems.


some modes employed more frequently in bookworks:

classification definition examination experimentation illustration imagination inventarization investigation itemization manipulation observation permutation quantification repetition systematization variation verification

the most successful books often make their point by employing a single mode

SIMPLE JAPANESE BINDING

For · INDIVIDUAL Pages




- ⊕ Between ½-1" in from your edge to be bound, mark an even number of holes (i.e. 4, 6, 8, etc. must be an <u>Even</u> #!!)
- (you can just eyeball the distances)
- @ Put a weight on your neatly piled up pages, to prevent shifting.
- (b) with a hammer & nail (& corrogated cardboard stacked under heath)

 pound holes where you have marked.


An electric drill is even better if you have one.

- 4) Holes must be fairly good size as you want to draw needle & strong thread (or string) through 3 times in each bole.
- * Keep weight on the pages & move pile carefully to edge of table & sew there, without shifting holes.
- 1) Use a nucle with big hole; long strong thread or string, or yarn; No knot at end.




starting from tell side — follow arrow marks with your thread: solid lines are outside & dotted lines are coming around from underheath.


