The seventh volume of the Liberator commenced on the first of January, 1837. During the term of its existence, it has succeeded, in despite of calumny and a strong opposition, in dispelling the apathy of the nation, creating an extraordinary and most auspicious interest for the oppressed, inducing a rigid investigation of the subject, and securing a host of mortal combatants who are pledged never to retreat from the field. The wrongs of the slaves—the danger of keeping them longer in bondage—the duty of giving them immediate freedom—are the topics of conversation or discussion in all debating societies—in lyceums—in stages and steamboats—in pulpits and in periodicals—in the family circle, and between a man and his friend. The current of public sentiment is turning, and soon it will roll a mighty river, sweeping away in its healthful and resistless career all the pollutions of slavery.

THE LIBERATOR was the first paper ever established for the immediate Abolition of American Slavery. It is therefore identified with the Anti Slavery cause; and in the language of that distinguished philanthropist GERRIT SMITH, "it is, and ever should be dearer to the heart of the thorough American Abolitionist, than any other periodical." Its patronage has never been sufficient to defray its expenses. 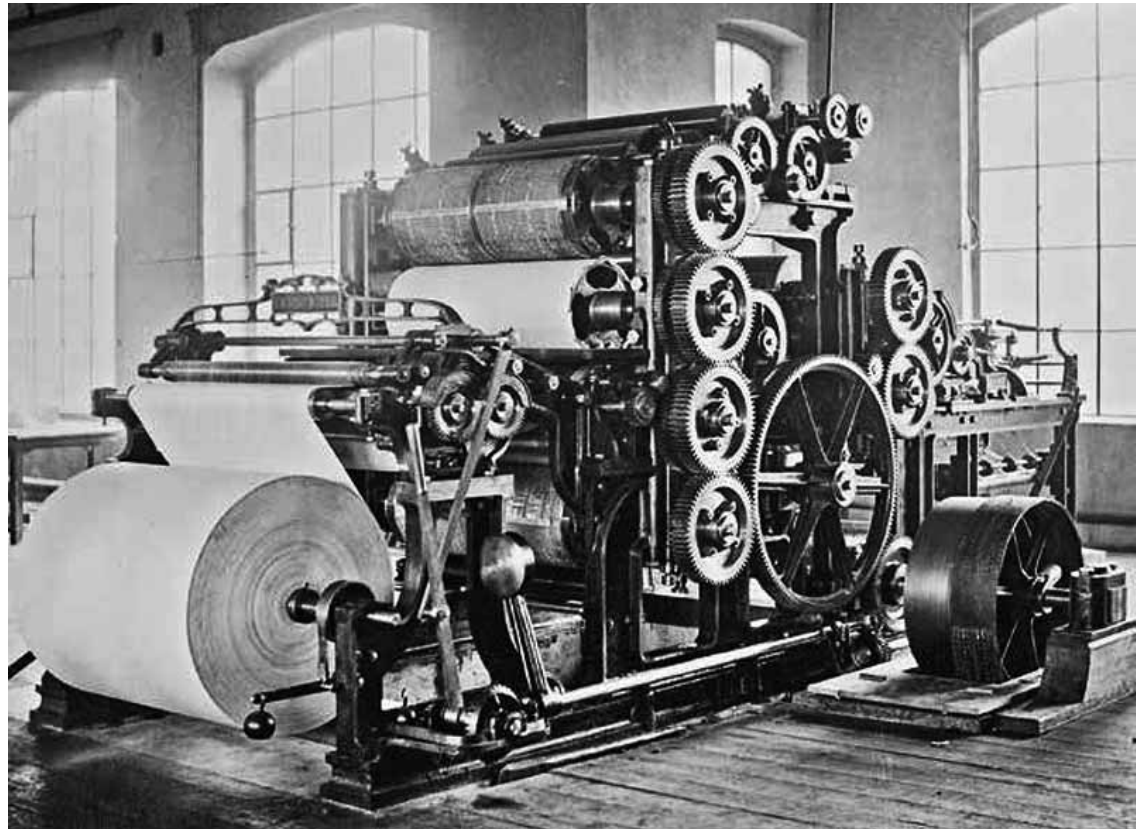


In 1847 an American inventor named Richard March Hoe patented the rotary, or web press, which fed a continuous sheet of paper around a cylinder



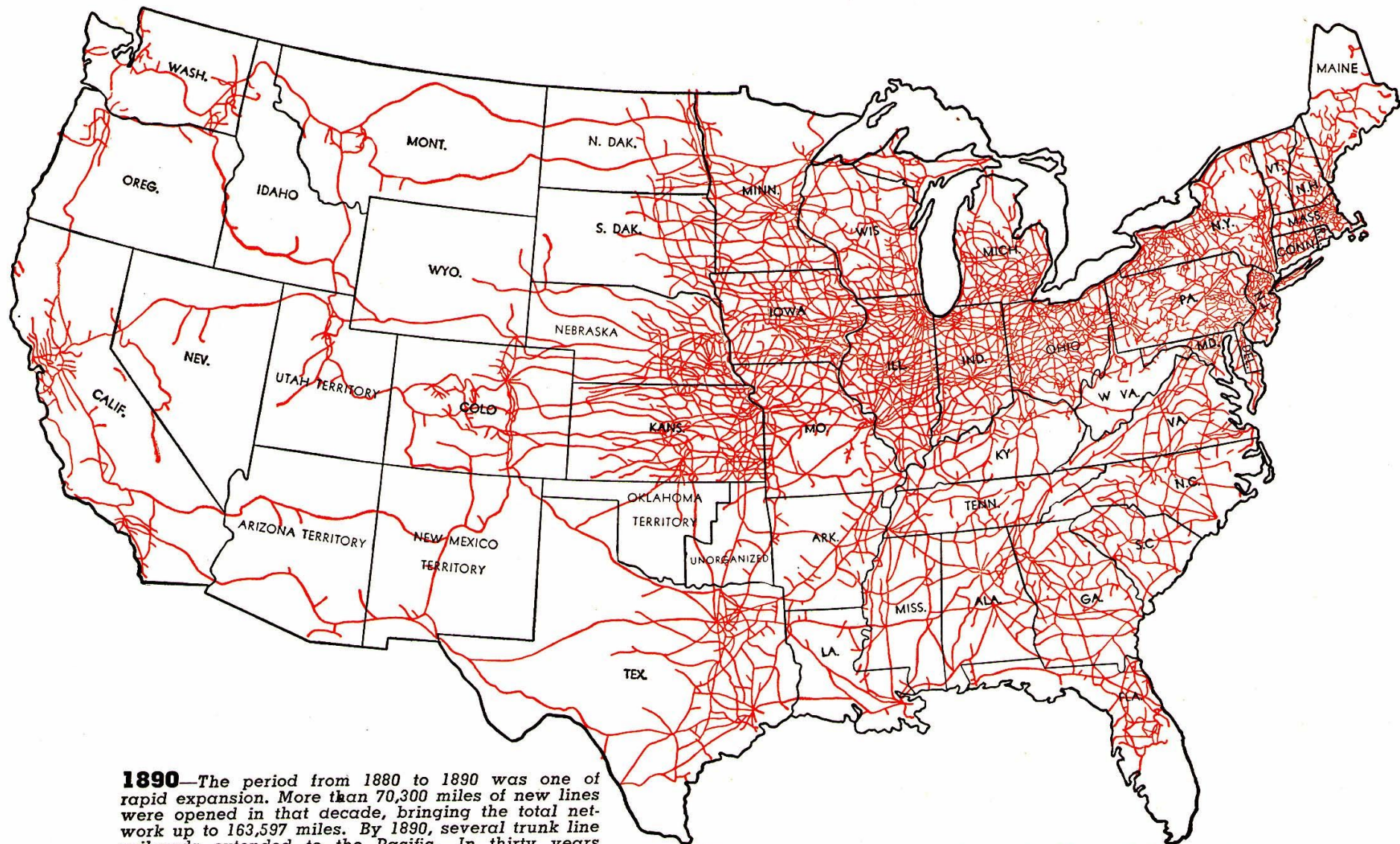
HOE'S SIX CYLINDER PRINTING PRESS.

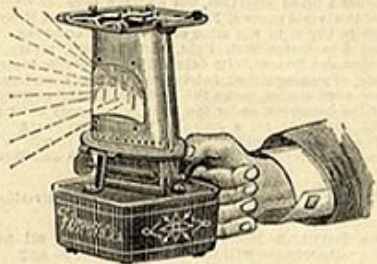

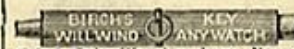

## CAPITALISTS START WARS AND PROFIT BY THEM -- WORKERS DIE IN THEM

What have the Mexican workers done to the workers of the United States that we should be so uncivilized as to even think of laying down our tools to go into THEIR country and kill them!

Why should the workers of the United States be enlisted in the fight of the oil companies which rob the Mexicans in the same manner as we are robbed?

The capitalist class is in a struggle as to who shall rob the workers of Mexico, and in order to let a bully of a general like Huerta down easy and save his dignity, petty insults have been invented for the purpose of supplying an excuse for the intervention of this country. For this we poor workers must sacrifice our sons, our brothers and if need be our fathers.

If this mess results in a war between these two countries it will be a blot on the intelligence of the nation.

If the capitalist class attempts to send troops to kill the workers of Mexico every labor union in the country should protest in a manner which will be an everlasting lesson to the exploiters.

Created by Exploiters.

Wherever Socialists have power in legislation they have stopped wars. It is the workers who suffer the consequences of wars, while the exploiters grow fat on the spoils.

The capitalist class use patriotism, nationality, emblems, flags, imaginary boundary lines, any old thing to keep us fighting so that they can reap the benefit, even to teaching us different languages and inventing games to stir up race hatred, and the worst of it all is the workers never tumble to it.

The cry goes up that this is anti-patriotism. Well, if saving the lives of our young men from the horrors of the battlefield, if saving the country from the capitalist robbers who create wars for the purpose of emptying the treasury is anti-patriotism, then we are guilty.

The real patriot is the person who stands for the international brotherhood of man, and the preservation of the race.

War has no place in this age of civilization and it is the duty of every person who has the welfare of his country and the welfare of the workers of the world at heart to do his best to avert it.

## MAY DAY PROCLAMATION

Comrades and Fellow-Workers:

May Day is labor's international holiday. On the first of May the workers the world over will demonstrate the increasing strength and solidarity of the "working class."

The past year has stripped from capitalism its mask of hypocrisy. It has shown the workers that the "capitalist class" is, and can never be anything else but, the enemy of the working class. In West Virginia, Colorado and Michigan the mine owners have used all the powers of the state to beat the workers into submission.

Even in our own city we have experienced the iron heel of capitalism, every ready to crush the worker until he is living and working under conditions which he can no longer tolerate. We have seen our brothers on the street cars revolt against such conditions; our sisters in the department stores have rebelled, and our brothers in many of the other industries have struggled with the capitalist class in an effort to obtain a decent living.

The millions of workers in all parts of the world will on this day meet with but one aim in view, and that is, to hasten the day when the workers will no longer be exploited by a master class, but will own and operate the industries for the benefit of all of the people.

The May Day celebration in Buffalo will be held under the auspices of the Socialist Party. A parade will form at 7:30 p. m., in front of the City Hall and at seven forty-five (7:45) will march to the Elmwood Music Hall. There they will be addressed by Victor L. Berger, of Milwaukee, who was the first and only Socialist ever elected to the United States Congress.

The Socialist Party extends to every working class organization in Buffalo, an invitation to participate in the May Day demonstration and celebration.

Organizations which intend to join in the parade should advise the city organizer so that they can be assigned to places.

## VICTOR L. BERGER WILL BE BIG ATTRACTION AT MAY DAY CELEBRATION

**Ex-Congressman Will Pay His First Visit to Buffalo  
— Has Message that Every Workingman and  
Woman in Buffalo Should Hear — Will Tell of  
His Experiences in the Fight Against the  
Capitalist Interests.**



- 1 Tbsp granulated garlic

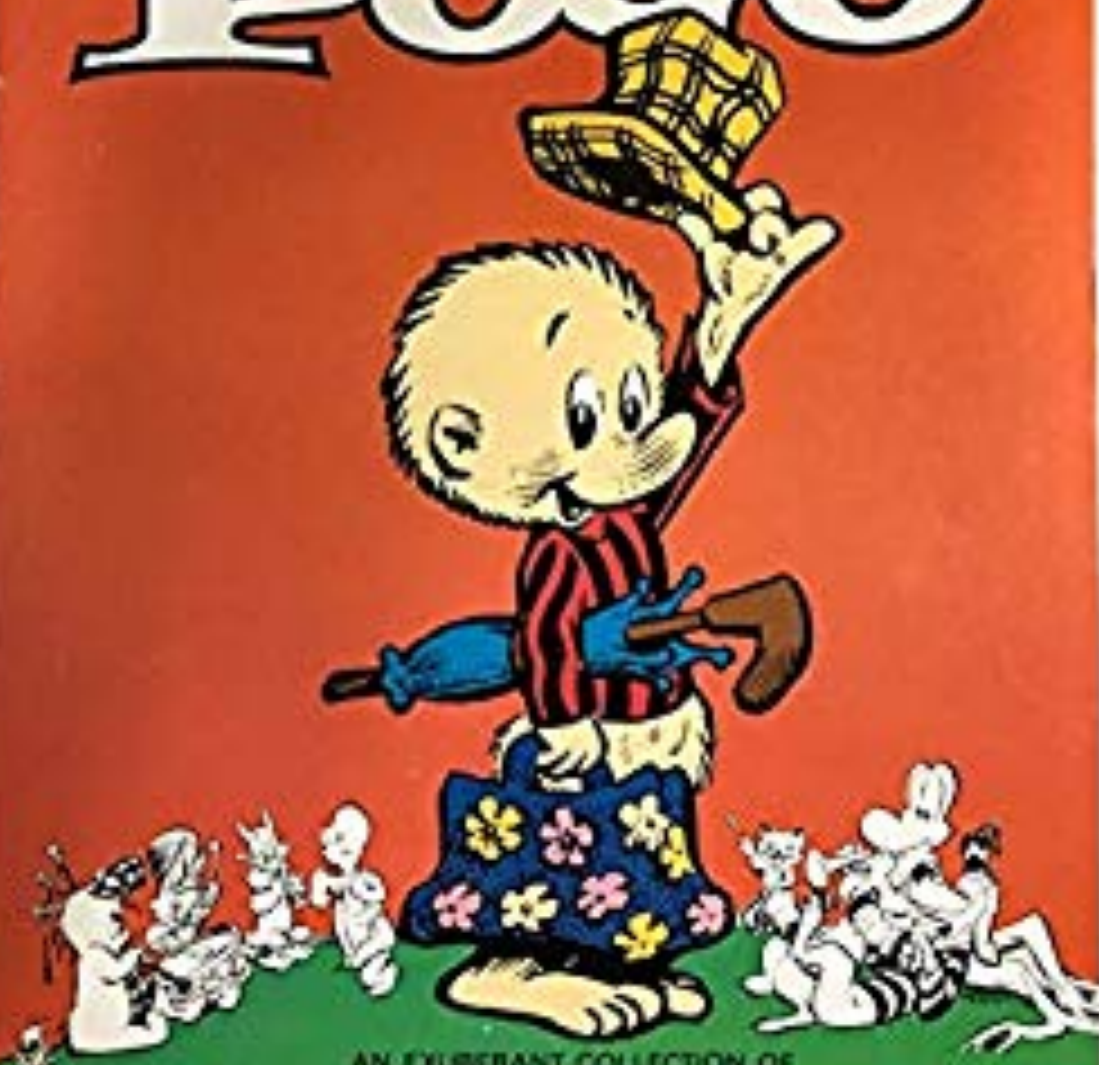

### EDITORIAL! Military snoops GI mail

### Wanted

THE BRASS AND THEIR FLUNKIES ARE MAKING EVERY EFFORT TO PREVENT *THE ALLY* FROM BEING CIRCULATED TO GIs. A MARINE AT MCAS FORT RYAN FILED US IN ON THE SITUATION IN JAPAN. "THINGS ARE REALLY GETTING BAD HERE. OMI HEAD-HUNTERS HAVE BEGUN SEIZING PACKAGES OF *THE ALLY* AT THE STATION POST OFFICE. I WAS ONE OF THE LUCKY ONES, AS MY 50 COPIES GOT THRU TO ME." SUCH INCIDENTS HAVE OCCURRED BEFORE, BUT NOW THEY ARE HAPPENING WITH GROWING FREQUENCY.

GIs in Korea have told us that the CID has been checking mail clerks out and asking them to intercept "suspicious" packages. Feedback from Korea, unlike *Jeakuni*, indicates that mail clerks haven't been exactly cooperative. There is also growing evidence that some efforts to curb the growing influence of *The Ally* are being made through stateside post offices and at stateside bases. We suspect that the FBI and CID have been working together with some postal officials to prevent circulation of our paper.

The brass and the postal authorities have no legal ground to attack us directly. Such an attack would only throw the spotlight on their illegal activities of disrupting the mail and provide us with increased civilian support. Also, they are not eager to test base regulations against *The Ally* in court of public concern. They have chosen to quietly attempt to check us at the post office—both stateside and overseas. While the government mouths the hoarse words of constitutional fairness, a secret government of FBI, CID, postal inspectors and police spies are trying to strangle us and our GI readers.

As the government becomes more secretive in its policies—for example, the

military budget for Vietnam was recently declared classified—the American public is expected to offer up its right of privacy.

Last month, under the guise of stopping the dope traffic, a "no-knock" law was passed so Federal and state officials can bust into anyone's house at anytime if they suspect there are drugs there.

Also, this month the government issued a new postal regulation. It authorized the opening of mail from overseas without the recipient's permission. Under these regulations any postal clerk can refer any overseas mail to the Customs Bureau of the Treasury Department for inspection. The excuse given—you guessed it—it to stem the flow of pornographic material. The government can call practically anything pornographic. The result is that any mail that looks suspicious may be opened. We wonder how many of these postal officials are being bought up by the FBI?

A "no-knock" law is unnecessary for the brass and their flunkies—they've always had one. It's called "inspection." But military regulations have formally guaranteed the privacy of GI mail. Now even that last fragment of GI privacy is being violated by the brass and their police spies—CID, ONI, etc. The privacy of the mail is guaranteed by the Constitution. We urge GIs to defend this small area of freedom that even military regulations acknowledge.

What can our readers do? First, help us collect evidence that the brass disrupts GI mail for a congressional investigation. Also, try to gain the cooperation of sympathetic mail clerks. The friendly non-cooperation of company mail clerks from CID Encls will keep *The Ally* going through. Where this is impossible, keep up informed. If you have any ideas on the mail or if your mail is being hassled then let us know. Be vigilant! *The Ally* you save might be your own.

### \*GIs sucked toward new war

The CIA, America's secret government, has started another war. With war fever mounting in Laos and Thailand, Cambodia has exploded into a frenzy of military activity. Despite pious promises, Nixon can be counted on to get the U.S. further embroiled in war.

What has happened? On March 16 the Cambodian government of

Prince Norodom Sihanouk was overthrown. Right-wing Lt. Gen. Lon Nol took over as Prime Minister. There are many reasons to believe that the right-wing takeover was instigated by the CIA.

• The first act of General Lon Nol was to grant the right of "hot pursuit" by U.S. forces into Cambodia. Now GIs can be sent in

anytime by the Saigon Command. This right had been claimed and acted upon in the past, but Sihanouk had opposed it. Cambodians had resisted U.S. intrusions into Cambodia.

• The U.S. promptly recognized the new Cambodian military government. This government immediately removed the anti-aircraft emplace-

ments in border areas that Sihanouk had ordered into place to keep the U.S. out of Cambodia.

• General Lon Nol also invited the South Vietnamese regime to attack the VC across the Cambodian border. General Ky sent his immediate congratulations to Gen. Nol. It has been a long-established fact that the CIA set up the original South Vietnamese regime in violation of the 1954 Geneva Agreements.

• U.S. and foreign banks have been invited back into Cambodia. Sihanouk kicked them out five years earlier in order to guarantee his neutrality in the Vietnam war. There has been pressure among the Cambodian elite for their return.

• Cambodia is giving back a Thailand-bound hipacked munitions ship that sailed into Cambodian waters. This is further indication of the new spirit of "cooperation" between the Cambodian military government and the U.S.

• Much is made of the claim that Cambodia is swearing with Viet Cong. But no VC attack on Cambodia has occurred. Instead, elements of the Cambodian Army have attacked pro-Sihanouk gatherings, killing some people.

• A presumed CIA sponsored ploy was to foment a race riot of

unemployed (and therefore bribe-able) Cambodians against the Vietnamese minority living in Phnom Penh, capital of Cambodia. This minority is conveniently labeled Viet Cong. There may, of course, be some VC sympathizers among them. The important point though is that demonstrators carried signs in English denouncing the VC. These signs suggest a CIA public relations campaign for American consumption, since English is not a language spoken by Cambodians. Magazines like *Newsweek* carried photos of these demonstrators without questioning their motives.

• The Cambodian government has announced that they would remove the Cambodian populations from border areas with Vietnam. This is a CIA method of "counter-insurgency" now underway in Laos.

• Sihanouk recognized the danger of the Army. He said his Army was ripe for bribing and the CIA does the bribing in Southeast Asia. He said that "the U.S. would like to penetrate into Cambodia and change the country's politics and ideology. I am sure the Americans have already made wonderful promises, particularly to the Army."

• General Lon Nol was known to

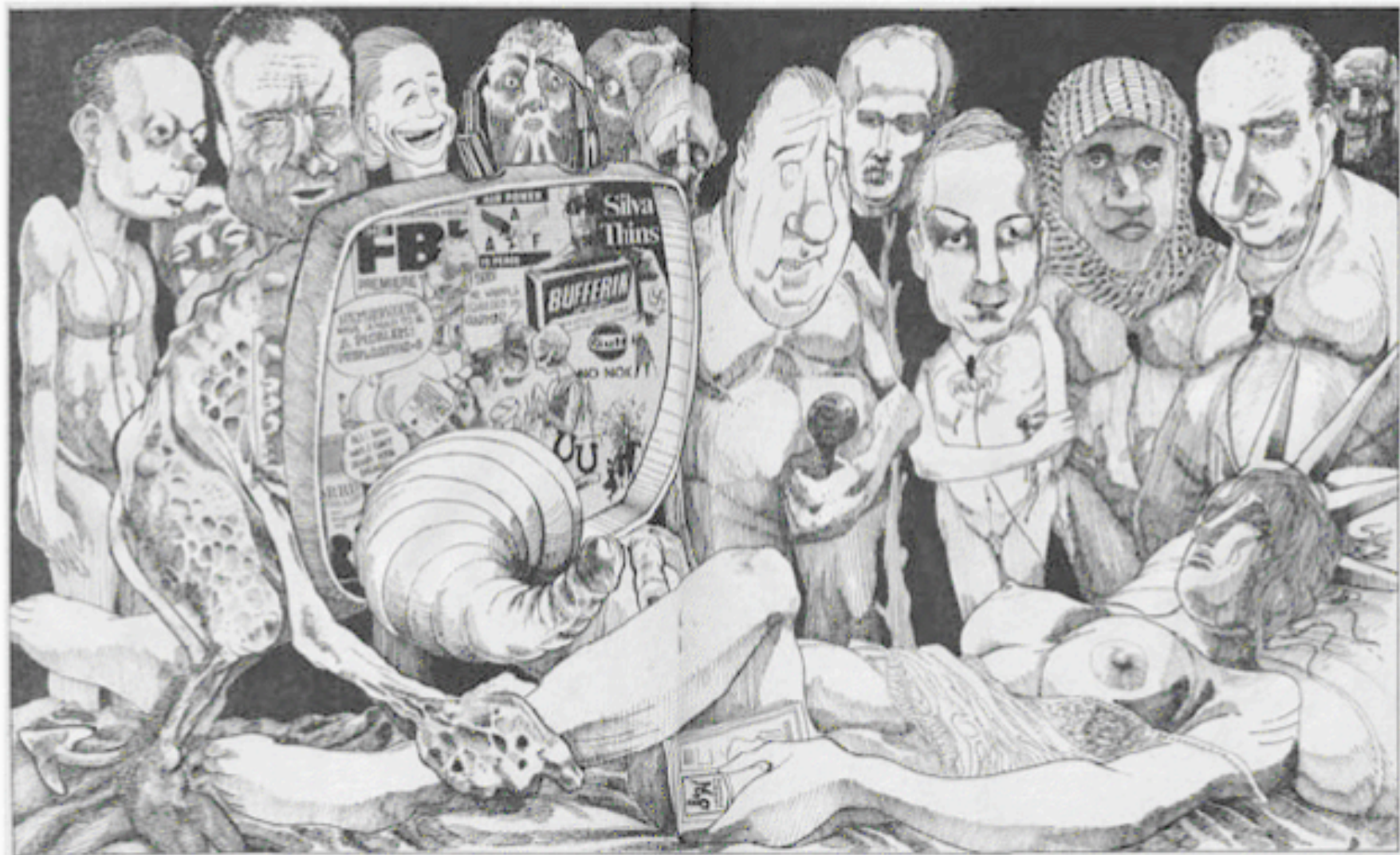


Figure 19. Dick Guindon, "Rosemerica's Baby," *Realist*.

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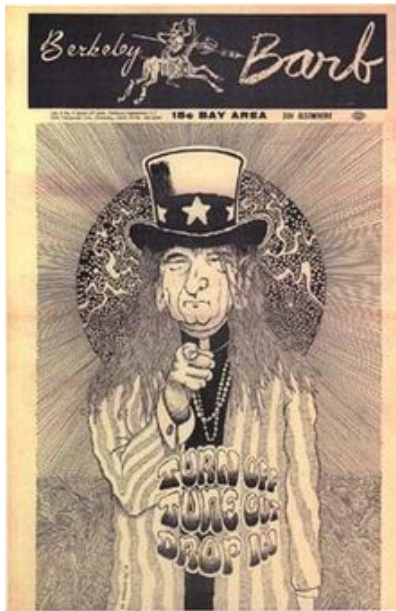
